


Figure 1: Distribution chart for degree

From the data provided in Table 1 on the distribution users by titration, Figure 1 shows the percentage of each titration.




Figure 2: Countries that have accessed the journal




Figure 3: amount of hits between 2014 and 2018

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


Figure 4: Amount of cities between 2014 and 2018




Figure 5: Amount of average between 2014 and 2018

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


Figure 6: Amount of countries between 2014 and 2018




Figure 7: Amount of users between 2014 and 2018

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


Figure 8: Amount of Viewers between 2013 and 2018




Figure 9: Resolution Report for prefix 10.14807 from between 2014 and 2018

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


Figure 10: Profile of the users that access the journal, classified by age and sex.
